



Office Notes

When calling the Town of Brookhaven for appliance/metal recycling pick up, be sure to specify Belle Terre Village, as they no longer pick up in Port Jefferson Village.

Please! No yard waste or grass clippings with kitchen refuse. They should be disposed of privately.

Residents that are bothered with sales people or anyone soliciting at their door, should put a "No Solicitation" sign on their door or mailbox. There are rules that anyone soliciting should go by, they must call in at the office or the constable's office before going around, but many don't.

For all items such as alarms going off, or suspicious persons/vehicles, call "911." It wastes time calling the office first. 911 goes out over the airways and if our constables are on duty they will pick it up.

The Dumpster at the Community Centre is only intended for people using the building. When used, garbage should be put in the dumpster, *not on the ground in front or behind it*. No large objects such as furniture or building refuse should be left there.

Homeowners should also be aware that the refuse collector is forbidden to pick up any large refuse on his regular round, so do not leave any at the roadside until the appointed pick-up date.




Belle Terre's Pat Geelan

The beauty of Belle Terre's laurel cannot possibly have escaped you this past June.

The pictures below help us understand laurel. When laurel gets old, it gets tall and leggy with few leaves and flowers (picture 1), but when cut back rather severely, (pictures 2), not just trimmed, like the legendary

phoenix that rises in youthful freshness from its own ashes, laurel regenerates and forms tight clusters of vigorous green leaves. The regeneration process takes time. You will have to wait a year or two to have blossoms, but if you cut back your leggy laurel in the fall, the long term results will be magnificent!

Keys to the building for all affairs, will be given out by the Inspector. No one can Rent any part of the building during the daytime while the Youth Program is in effect.
