That being said, the book set the stage for our visits to five places in the last five months. (Traveling in the "off season" is so inexpensive and there are no crowds.) We have





"STAR OF THE SEA" AND THE FUTURE OF BELLE TERRE

"When we were kids, we used to go down to 'Star of the Sea' and swing on the vines." ----Paula Dwyer, age 46, lifetime resident of Belle Terre

Drive down Saint's Orchard, bear right on Valley, and you come to house number 24, "Star of the Sea." North of it is an empty lot which once contained the trees and vines that Paula Dwyer is referring to. A few, very few, trees remain on this lot. Here, folks, you see the future of Belle Terre's woodlands. Continue along Valley (which at some point becomes Beach) and you'll see more of the degradation of Belle Terre's once beautiful roadsides. If they are not reclaimed, we shall have to resort to what I call "the landscaper look." The natural woods disappear to be replaced by lawns and shrubs from a nursery, and we will then be the same as

any development on Long Island. With a few, all too few, volunteers we are trying each winter to make inroads in cleaning up Belle Terre.* You may have noticed our efforts along Cliff Road, behind the gatehouse, and along East Broadway, but when I take walks or see areas like those at Star of the Sea, I realize what remains to be done and frankly want to weep.

On a cheerful note, I thought you might be interested in the history of "Star of the Sea." The phrase refers to Mary and is well known in the Roman Catholic faith.

Churches and schools around the country are named St. Mary Star of the Sea. The term was made known by the formidable fourth century Latin scholar St. Jerome who used "stella maris", star of the sea, in his Latin translation of the Hebrew Bible.

Our Belle Terre Star of the Sea was built in the 1930's. The house, at that time with natural brown

shingles and white trim, was a retreat and summer residence for the Daughters of Wisdom**, the nuns who founded Saint Charles Hospital and Maryhaven. Children with polio were brought to Star of the Sea to escape momentarily the confines of a once dreary hospital. Today no one can imagine the terrorizing effect of the word "polio" in the 1940's ... akin to the effect of "TB" in the nineteenth century and to "cancer" and "AIDS" in the twentieth. Polio was the one dreaded disease. Every night parents prayed their children would escape polio. Short of death, it was the worst that could happen. As a child I understood that if you got polio, it

meant you were put in that mysterious institution Saint Charles Hospital, were placed in a machine called an iron lung, and if you were lucky enough ever to walk again, it would be with steel braces on your legs. At the time Saint Charles was so renowned for its care of polio patients that it was honored with the visit of President Franklin Roosevelt, then a secret polio victim.

Driving with my mother on Cliff Road we would often pass a small darkhaired woman walking briskly toward the point. "That's Jenny Kazan (The accent was on "zan."), my mother would say. "She had polio, and now she walks every day." She said this with a certain reverence, as if attesting to a miracle. Jenny seemed to me the only person in



the whole world who had ever recovered from polio. Unlike Jenny, most kids wore braces and had their picture on a March of Dimes container.

Today Star of the Sea is still used as a place of retreat and meeting center for programs under the aegis of the Catholic Health Services (CHS). The house has always fascinated me, the way most places connected to tragedy have a hold on us. I have never been inside, but would like to go there someday. Once there, I know thoughts would flood in of all the children in the 1940's who were not so lucky as I. And as for that empty lot beside Star of the Sea where Paula Dwyer used to swing on the vines, I hope that Belle Terre's woodlands will not one day too be reduced to a briar patch.

- * To help clean up Belle Terre, cut off the vine as close to the root as possible. Then cut it again at eye level to make it easy to pull down next year and to prevent any new shoots from grabbing onto the old vine.
- ** The Daughters of Wisdom, founded in 1703 in Poitiers, France by Saint Louis de Montfort and Marie-Louise Trichet, had as their purpose to seek divine wisdom in suffering humanity. In 1904 they were forced by the secularization laws of France to seek ministries elsewhere. In that year, 1904, they arrived in northern Maine. It was the same year that Dean Alvord was building the Belle Terre entrance.


Most of the landscaping around the Community Centre and on some of the triangles is done by BTCA's beautification ladies, free and for the betterment of Belle Terre.
