2009 Spring Trash Collection Week of April 26th

Bagged leaves and bundled branches will be picked up but must be kept separate from the household trash as they are picked up by a different truck. Twigs, Branches and Yard debris should be bundled and tied into bundles that are no more than 4 feet long.

In a separate pile, large household items such as mattresses, furniture, appliances, and other household goods can be placed at the curb. Appliances should be empty and doors removed for safety. Time to clean the basement! All items should be at the curb by Sunday night. Maggios will only come through each street one time during the week of April 26th, so if you miss the pick up, they will not come back.

The Golden Step

It was in New York City 1959, in the late spring. Stephanie's girlfriend Carol was planning a sweet 16 birthday party. "I know this guy named Lucio and I want you to come to my party as his date," she said. "I'll show you who he is and introduce him to you at the bus stop after school." Lucio planned to meet Stephanie at her home and walk the four blocks to her girlfriend's house. Lucio was too embarrassed to hold Stephanie's hand on the walk home even after having a great time together at the

party.



As soon as the music on the back patio started Stephanie and Lucio got up and started dancing. Dancing the Lindy they twirled multiple turns and kicked their shoes to the sky. They had never danced together before, and neither one was aware of how good their partner was going to be. This was their dance, the first of a lifetime of paired moves.

Lucio and Stephanie dated after that sweet 16 party. By the time they started college they became great friends. Dance became one of the themes that led them around New York City to find bands in Manhattan's lesser known, more affordable clubs that could inspire their dancing. They fell in love both on and off the dance floor.

Soon after they became engaged to be married, they decided to enter the polka contest of the 1962 Harvest Moon Ball national dance competition held in New York City. Unlike today, dancers competed in specific dances. Stephanie decided to teach Lucio a dance he didn't know, the polka. They entered the polka division. She made their costumes and rented the

appropriate boots for the semi-finals and then Stephanie made interpretive costumes when, to their surprise, they placed in the national finals. They invited all their friends and relatives to watch them dance in Madison Square Garden. With thousands of people witnessing their dance skill they jumped and spun around the dance floor smiling and enjoying every move.

The fame of dancing in Madison Square Garden, even though they didn't win the first prize, led to many organizations to hire them to dance for various events. They became local celebrities in New Jersey and New York.

Following their marriage in 1964 they raised a family of four children and put their dance "careers" on hold. Meanwhile Lucio taught high school mathematics, and Stephanie continued her art career by teaching part time and privately.

In the early 80's an acquaintance at a local parish dance asked them to show him and his partner some dance moves and a new idea was born. He encouraged them to find a venue to teach the dancing that they did so well. Continuing education, colleges, elementary, junior and senior high schools, libraries. museums and a host of other private organizations began hiring the couple to perform and to teach dance. Word of mouth helped them to spread their joy of dancing. Their calendar is dance full. From ballroom to latin to folk dance and wedding-preparation dance, Stephanie and Lucio fulfilled their passion to dance the night away

This coming June they will be celebrating 45 years of marriage but it's been 50 years that they have been dance partners, their golden anniversary.

Mayor Gary Vegliante was instrumental in the creation of the Village of West Hampton Dunes in November of 1993. He was elected its Mayor in March of 1994 in the Village's first election, and has since been re-elected four times. His current term runs until the year 2012.

Mayor Vegliante moved to Belle Terre, with his wife Claire and two children Gary and Colette in August 1995. He received his Masters Degree in Education from Long Island University.

Mayor Vegliante has been featured in many national and local publications regarding a variety of municipal issues, including but not limited to municipal creation, coastal management including public access, endangered species management, municipal electric & gas utilities. He is a strong advocate of Municipal Home Rule and has been involved in a series of successful landmark Federal and State lawsuits protecting the rights of Village Sovereignty and Constituent's Advocacy.

Mayor Vegliante is a past president of Suffolk County Village Officials Association (SCVOA), Tri-County Village Association, and sits the first Vice President of the New York Conference of Mayors (NYCOM).

Gary A. Vegliante will be installed as the



President of NYCOM (New York Conference of Mayors) for its 100th year anniversary on June 29 2009, in Saratoga Springs, NY. It is an honor for him to have been selected to serve as President of such an esteemed organization.
