




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Nancy Orth's Grandson



OUR IMPORTANT DRAINAGE

There are approximately 68 drains throughout the village, including 2 new ones installed last year on Motts Hollow Rd.

Village personnel takes care of keeping the surface clear of leaves, but periodically the drains need to be cleaned professionally. Sand, dirt, leaves, etc accumulate at the bottom and they do not empty properly. Special equipment is needed to do this at a cost of \$300 to \$750 per drain depending on the size. This was done earlier this year to three drains on Seaside Drive that have here the line of the size of the size.



to three drains on Seaside Drive that have been flooding the road for a number of years, as well as one on Beach Rd. at Sunset Path.

Each year the village tries to allocate some money in the budget to throughly clean several drains.

Everyone has seen the mess or devastation that ocurrs when their own or the road drainage is not doing its job.
